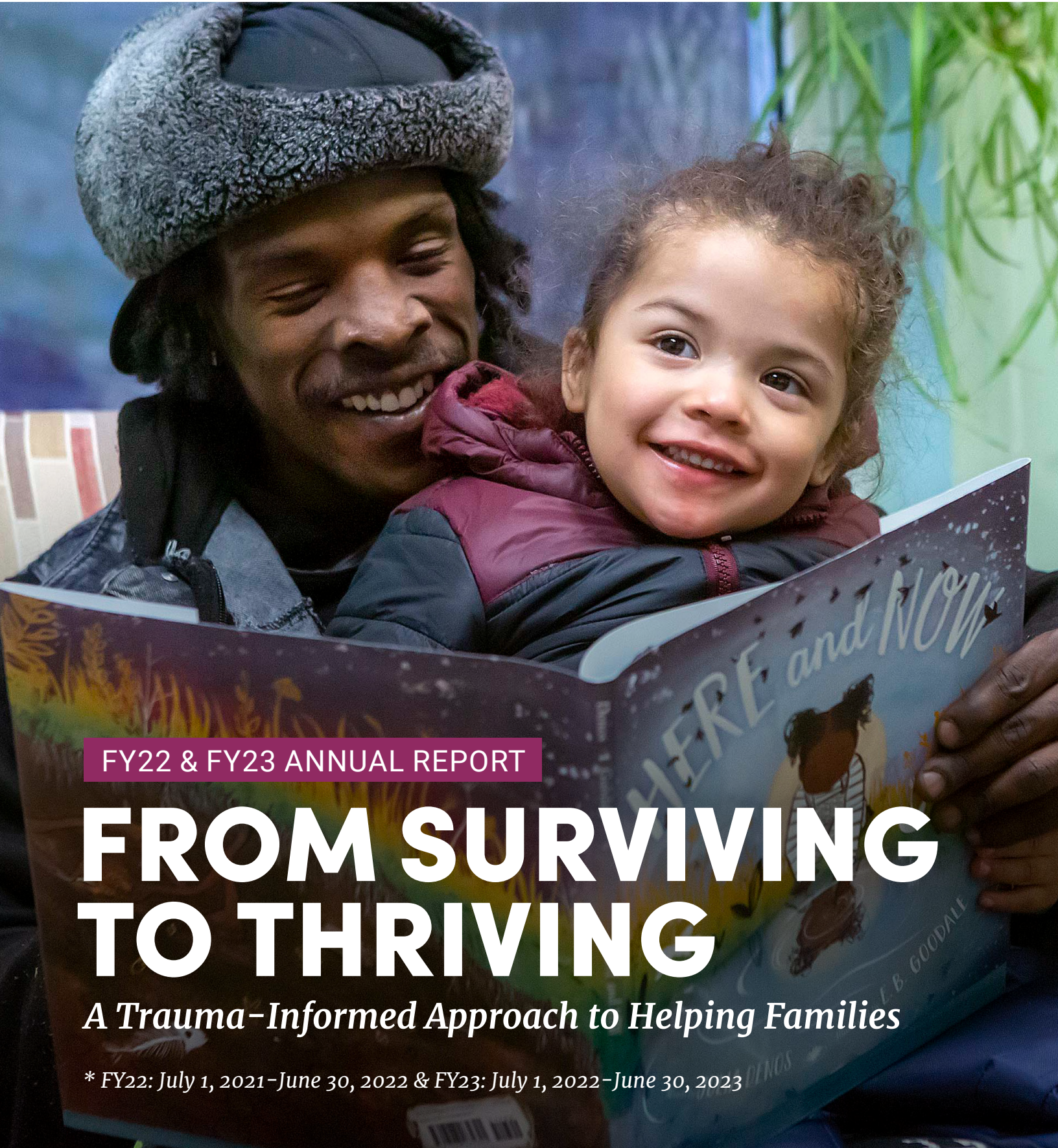

A LETTER FROM BOARD CO-CHAIRMAN QUINTIN PRIMO III

In 1978, my father, the Right Reverend Quintin Primo, Jr. opened The Urban Center of St. Barnabas in Garfield Park on Chicago's West Side.

He took inspiration from his father, a priest who immigrated to the United States from British Guiana and hoped to earn a medical degree and return home to serve his community. While my grandfather never achieved his primary goal, my father did when he created The Urban Center to serve the needs of the impoverished West Side community. In 1996, The Urban Center of St. Barnabas was renamed the Primo Center for Women and Children in Bishop Primo, Jr.'s honor.

I am very humbled by my father's vision and by the heartfelt work of Primo Center's staff each and every day. Through focus, dedication and drive, the team has raised the bar in delivering critical social services and best-in-class outcomes for Chicago families experiencing homelessness. Thanks to its track record of achievement, Primo Center has not only survived but thrived through many challenges including the pandemic and its aftereffects. Primo Center continues to grow and offer more services to those who need them, without exception. There aren't enough words to express my gratitude for each person who works at Primo Center, our Board, supporters and volunteers. I am confident that my father would be proud and amazed by the remarkable inroads and exceptional work the Primo Center has achieved in the community.

VISUAL TIMELINE OF MILESTONES

Primo Center began 2022 with a newly-opened shelter in the Austin neighborhood at 4952 W. Madison Street with 210 beds and an on-site health clinic provided in partnership with Lawndale Christian Health Center (LCHC).

At the time of the shelter's opening, there were only two community-based health centers in the neighborhood, which has a population of more than 97,000, compared to the six centers in the neighboring Oak Park.

With the opening of the Austin shelter, growth became a major theme of 2022-2023: Primo Center expanded its services and developed new partnerships.

The Austin shelter opens with 210 beds and an on-site health clinic provided in partnership with Lawndale Christian Health Center (LCHC).

Primo Center Hosts the *Housing and Health Care for People Experiencing Homelessness Summit* with the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA)



SEPTEMBER 2022

Primo Center hosts its first in-person event since the pandemic, a staff-led fundraiser.



JANUARY 2023

U.S. Representative Danny K. Davis announced funding for Primo Center's new Trauma Informed Network (TIN).



MAY 2023

10th anniversary of the Permanent Supportive Housing Program.

Primo Center opened its first permanent supportive housing development in the Hermosa neighborhood on May 1, 2013, a 12-unit facility to serve highly vulnerable homeless families. The development features six two-bedroom units and six three-bedroom units, allowing residents to rebuild their familial foundation while also having on-site access to the supportive services they need to continue their journey toward self-sufficiency.



HOUSING

Primo Center is the largest provider of services and shelter for homeless children and their families in Chicago.

Serving those most vulnerable, the Center's record of helping families gain independence far exceeds the national average.

Primo Center serves families from all areas of the city of Chicago at Interim Housing (IH) campuses in Englewood (South) and Austin (West) and a Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) program in the Hermosa community west of downtown. The Center manages 330 shelter beds and 91 scattered housing units, *making the agency the largest provider of family shelter in Chicago.*

TRAUMA-INFORMED CARE

Primo Center's success is distinguished by its 360-degree approach to care called High Fidelity Wraparound, which is recognized nationally for helping break the cycle of homelessness for children and families. It aids the most at-risk children.

Trauma can lead to learning issues, employment challenges, mental and physical health problems, and other negative outcomes, including post traumatic stress disorder. And no one is immune: trauma has a ripple effect, impacting the person who was traumatized, the people closest to them, the community around them, and so on. *Primo Center's therapists consist of master's level clinicians* and Licensed Clinical Social Workers (LCSWs) who have decades of experience working with families facing trauma and homelessness.



FAMILY LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE

To address the needs of highly vulnerable families and end the cycle of homelessness for families, Primo Center focuses on trauma-informed care through its *Family Leadership Institute*. The Family Leadership Institute addresses each family member's traumatic exposure, empowers parents to support their children, and addresses children's developmental needs.

EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT

Primo Center enriches the lives of children from 0–5 years by bringing trauma-informed care to build their resilience, and by focusing on education, including operating an early childhood center and an innovative home visiting program.

For so many of these children, unresolved trauma and anxiety has an unseen impact, and the children struggle academically and socially. Reducing children's symptoms of traumatic



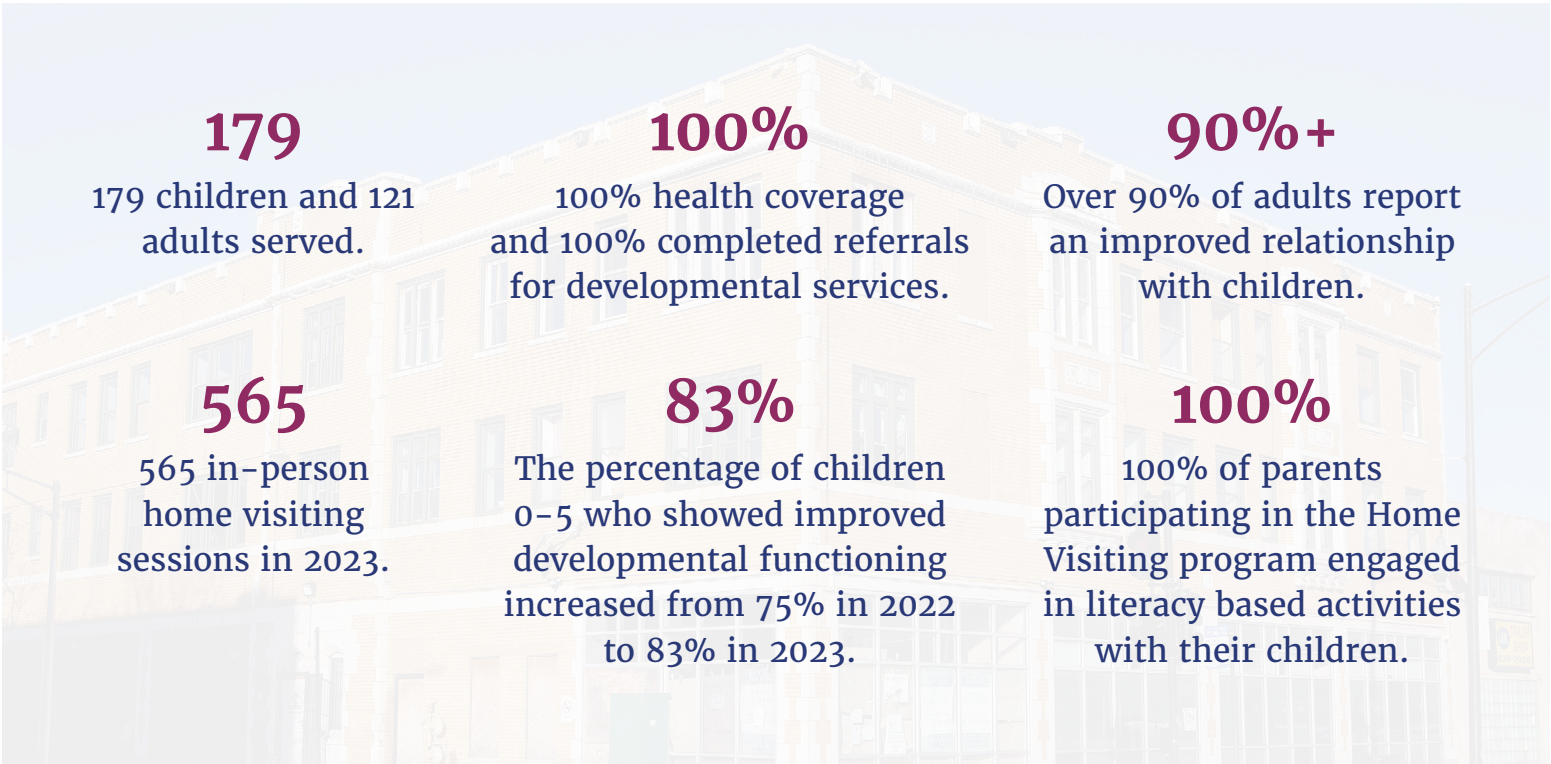
stress and increasing their coping mechanisms impacts developmental growth, readiness to learn, and school performance.

Children are helped to grow along the *four core developmental domains of social/emotional, physical, language, and cognitive*, and they learn conflict resolution and anger management with an emphasis on self-motivation and mastery. In addition, the parent-child relationship is strengthened through a variety of parenting support services. Overall, Primo Center’s trauma-informed social emotional services help level the playing field.

MATERNAL, INFANT, AND EARLY CHILDHOOD HOME VISITING (MIECHV)

The Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting Program supports pregnant people and parents with young children who live in communities that face greater risks and barriers to achieving positive maternal and child health outcomes. Families choose to participate in home visiting programs, and partner with health, social service, and child development professionals to set and achieve goals that improve their health and well-being.

INTEGRATED HEALTHCARE

Primo Center makes it a priority to provide integrated physical, dental, and mental health services for children and families.

Our trauma-informed approach allows us to meet families where they are, develop a plan that meets the needs of individual family members, and empowers parents to support their children and families.

The Primo Center offers access to primary medical care with Lawndale Christian Health Center's exam rooms co-located in the agency's Austin shelter site. The Center also partnered with Heartland Alliance Health to offer screenings and primary care medical intake at the Englewood shelter. The Primo Center is proud to be a Medicaid certified mental and behavioral health provider, with a Licensed Clinical Social Worker (LCSW) who is available to provide direct services to clients, as well as provide clinical supervision to the agency's Case Managers.



KIDS CONNECTED

Kids Connected is a groundbreaking project that creates a true system of care for homeless children and their families. In creating this system of care for homeless families, Kids Connected finally removes the barriers to primary, preventative, and mental health services for this hugely underserved population, creating a streamlined system that puts the family at the center of their care and wraps all needed services and supports around the family. This will result in improved health outcomes for mothers and children, better school outcomes, and stable housing. Kids Connected combines three key principles that have been used and refined across the country and have significant bodies of research, but have never been used with homeless families — systems of care, wraparound services, and integrated health homes. Kids Connected melds all three for the first time to deliver seamless support to homeless children with mental health needs and their families.

The project has implementation funding through November 2025 from the Illinois Children's Healthcare Foundation plus additional support from the Crown Family Foundation — and is potentially a model for national replication. In 2022, the Kids Connected expanded its staffing and program services.

NOURISHING HOPE

Primo Center has proudly partnered with Nourishing Hope (formerly Lakeview Food Pantry) since Fall of 2021 to supplement SNAP benefits and maintain food security with participant families.

The partnership started as part of Nourishing Hope's online market program. For Primo Center clients housed at the Englewood and Austin shelters, that means the ability to order free groceries online once a month. This benefit is also extended to households the Center has successfully placed into permanent housing. Nourishing Hope carefully packs these orders and either delivers them directly to shelter and housing sites or coordinates a pick-up with Primo Center staff, meeting residents where they are and ensuring that access to a physical pantry is not an obstacle to food security.

Whether a household is residing at a shelter or transitioning to permanent housing, lack of access to food can impact physical health, compound stress (affecting mental health), and strain benefits such as SNAP that need to stretch to meet a variety of needs. Nourishing Hope's support has been crucial to ensuring our clients receive the holistic support they need for permanent, secure outcomes and reduced recidivism.

In 2022, Nourishing Hope Chief Program Officer Jennie Hull said, "We're trying to meet people where they're at, with as much choice and dignity as possible." The extra effort goes a long way — not only can our residents access free groceries, but the partnership also fosters positive community engagement and routine. Often, resource providers can seem nameless and faceless when implementing services, worsening feelings of dehumanization that can occur when experiencing homelessness. The arrival of Nourishing Hope's iconic blue delivery van makes our partner's presence at our shelters known and personable.

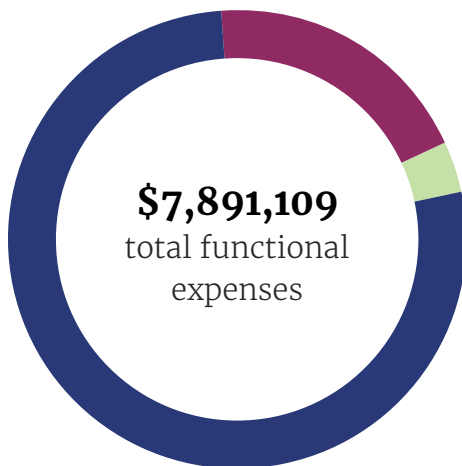

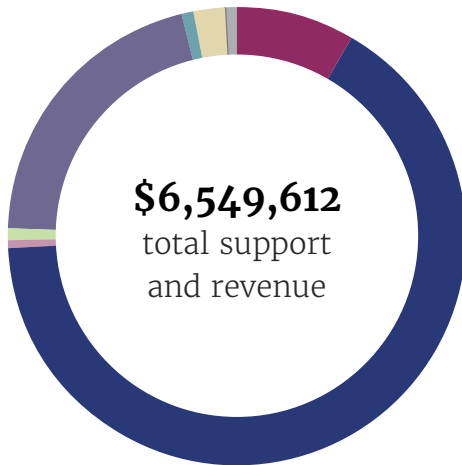

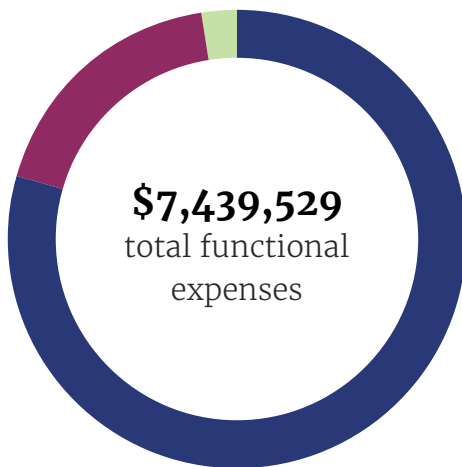
